1. Project activities and outcomes

a Describe the project outcomes.

During the past year the new Republic of Fiji Military Forces (RFMF) system, ArmsTracker, has had many new features developed. This includes:

- 1. Expansion of the ammunition register
- 2. Additional arms-types and functions
- 3. Improvements to user permission management
- 4. Improvements to user experience and ease of use, including additional tooltips
- 5. Bug fixing and enhanced stability
- 6. Improved reporting features and customisation
- 7. Location data improvements
- 8. New demonstration and training platform
- 9. Additional networking capability

This project also enabled training for RFMF Armourers and others relevant to the system and training materials to be developed for future trainings. ArmsTracker has been further customised for the RFMF to meet its specific needs and processes.

With assistance from this project, the Government of Fiji had come close to acceding to the ATT. Focus then shifted to the election in late 2022 and there has been a change of government. Briefings to parliamentary committees had included members of the new government, and so much of the progress made will remain. The new government is supportive of the ATT and we anticipate they will accede to the ATT in due course.

A review of Fiji's legislation has been undertaken, including a legislative gap analysis, baseline assessment and draft legislative amendments. This work remains relevant and accessible to the new government.

b Describe how the project has assisted your implementation of the ATT.

The greatest risk of diversion is from military armouries, as we have seen with attempted coups in Fiji in the past. This project further reduces that risk through improving the RFMF management of

arms and ammunition. The ArmsTracker system is also designed to enable ATT compliant transfers of arms and ammunition.

Enabling accession will further assist in ATT standards implementation and remove any doubt about the relevance of these standards to Fiji.

The legislative review enables legislative gaps to be filled.

c List all States that benefitted from the project.

Fiji is the primary beneficiary.

Development of additional features in ArmsTracker through this project will assist other States using ArmsTracker who will also receive those features. We are advised this includes Vanuatu and Samoa in the Pacific as well as some States in Africa.

The third RFMF on-site training was not held as the required training was completed through two training days.

While the legal gap analysis, baseline assessment and proposed legislative amendments have been done, the review of the Arms and Ammunition Act with the Attorney General's department was not completed as focus in the second half of 2022 turned to the election. As there is now a new Attorney-General and many new staff following the election, a new review and briefings will be required in a new project.

While the ATT Initial Report information has been prepared in consultation with agencies, the report cannot be submitted because accession has been delayed. It will be submitted upon accession.

Fiji is a leading peacekeeping nation and, with some attempted coups in the past involving armoury theft, it is important we do all we can to minimise the risk of arms diversion and comply with ATT standards.

We are still dealing with the impact of COVID and the disruption that has caused on our economy, so the issue of arms was not as high priority in 2022 as it was pre-COVID and expected to be again soon as we emerge from COVID.

The new military record-keeping and management system will continue to be upgraded and improve further. An ongoing licence for the system has been provided, with a commitment to fix any bugs in the future.

The training materials and legislative reform materials remain accessible to those who need them and continue to be of use.

j [For non-State Party only] How did the Project contribute to the progress of joining the Arms Trade Treaty?

This is addressed above. Materials have been provided explaining the benefits of the ATT to Fiji; parliamentary committees have been advised on the benefits of joining and their queries addressed; and those with doubts in key positions in the RFMF and Police with doubts about the ATT have been engaged and their concerns addressed. This has occurred through meetings and trainings. Further, a system on how to comply (ArmsTracker) has helped to show that it is possible without undue burden.

We will continue to:

- 1. roll out ArmsTracker with RFMF and respond to any issues and opportunities for improvement;
- 2. engage the relevant new Ministers on accession; and
- 3. assist the Attorney General's department with legislative reform to fully comply with the ATT.
